The profit distribution target rate quoted refers to the actual payment you may receive and is "before tax". As you will see from the paragraph below, your effective "after tax" return will vary depending on your individual circumstances.

### Individual account holders

Since 6 April 2016 all banks and building societies are no longer required to deduct tax from the savings returns you earn. If you are a basic or higher rate tax payer, you have an annual Personal Savings Allowance (PSA), allowing you to earn profit tax-free. However, once you reach your PSA limit, you will be required to pay tax on your profit. The PSA excludes ISAs, which continue to be tax-free for eligible customers.

The profit earned on a savings account is classed as income. Savers currently pay tax on this income, based on their income tax bracket. Under PSA basic rate taxpayers (20%) will be able to earn £1,000 in savings tax-free, whilst higher rate tax payers (40%) will receive a £500 allowance. Additional rate (45%) taxpayers will not receive any allowance.

Any savings returns you earn above your Personal Savings Allowance are subject to UK tax and it will be your responsibility to declare this to HM Revenue & Customs. Please note this applies to the total savings returns you earn from all the banks and building societies, not just Al Rayan Bank. You can find out more about PSA on [gov.uk](http://gov.uk).
